t's no secret, as a nurse, you tend to have more contact with patients than almost any other health care professional. You have a lot of responsibilities but devote a majority of your time to the treatment, safety, and recovery of those who are sick or injured. That close, personal care may soothe a patient, but if the proper precautions aren't taken, it's also a surefire way to spread an infection not just to them but also to you.

While there are numerous infections to be aware of, this program will focus on Clostridium difficile, often called C. difficile or C. diff. This infection is a bacterium that causes a number of symptoms, which can range from diarrhea to a life-threatening inflammation of the colon. C. difficile illnesses usually affect older adults in hospitals or in long term care facilities. These illnesses often occur after using antibiotic medications. There have been some cases of healthy people who are not hospitalized or on medication becoming infected. Medical professionals are finding C. difficile infections are becoming more common and more difficult to treat.

So what is the first step to protecting your health as a nurse and the health of your patients? Education. Understanding what Clostridium difficile is, the problems it causes and the treatments available can go a long way in stopping the spread of the infection. Another way to stay healthy is to be healthy by using the appropriate techniques of

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). A health care professional will be a part of our faculty to help you better understand the C. difficile infection and how to better protect yourself and your patients.

Remember, nurses are often a major source of comfort for patients, so let's make sure you're helping to alleviate their pain, not add to it.
